
The 'River of Hope' art competition as part of the celebrations for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee.



As you can see, there are many different representations of the queen by many artists and I invite you to create your own.


You can:

Maths

We have been working really hard across the school to improve our number sense and fluency. We aim that children have a really good understanding of how numbers work and can also recall number facts and times tables.

In Reception and KSI, we unpick counting, which is much trickier than first appears. We learn how numbers are made of other numbers and compare them. We also do lots of subsidising, which is all about identifying how many there are in small groups of objects without counting them. Research has shown that this is a key indicator of future mathematical success. We often use ten frames and play lots of games to help embed our knowledge and skills. Children learn facts such as the pairs of numbers that make 10 and that 7 is made of 5 and 2 more.

In KS2, we build on the children's knowledge and understanding of early number. We to work to ensure that children know addition and subtraction facts up to 20, e.g. 9 + 8 = 17, 13-5 = 8, and can apply this knowledge when working with larger numbers, e.g. 29 + 8 = 37, 63-5 = 58. We also work on knowledge of times table and division facts. We encourage children to use TTRockstars, as this websites can make a huge difference to the children's confidence.
